DESCRIPTION:
Horace Mann occupies the south half of the block between Wilshire and Charleville, stretching from Hamel to Robertson. Arnaz Drive was partially vacated to accommodate the campus. Designed in the Spanish Colonial Revival style with stuccoed exteriors and tiled hip roofs, the school contains three historic buildings. The main structure, built in 1929, is composed of a two story block enclosed by L-shaped, one story wings. A gated courtyard, accented by a tiled fountain now used as a planter, is defined by the plan. Centered behind the fountain, an entry is outlined with starshaped perforations in the stucco and illuminated by iron lanterns suspended from star brackets. This entry, which faces south, is supplemented by another on the east elevation. Also notable for its design, the east entrance features a double gothic arch with a decorated central column, surmounted by a large plasterwork tablet and crown. Other entries are located elsewhere in the building. The fenestration is consistent throughout, and consists of bands of tall casements separated by pilasters. Except for the doors, many of the openings have been re-glazed. Other alterations include the addition of concrete fences around portions of the building. In 1934 a kindergarten was added on the west side of the main building. One story, this detached structure is of similar design and materials. Notable elements include an entry framed by decorated piers and pilasters which carry a tiled hood and an opening outlined by diamond-shaped, patterned tile. The auditorium was built at the north end of the main building in 1937. Decorated lintels and round apertures were used on this building. Most of the windows have been enclosed. The most recent addition to the campus is a three-story, circular, concrete classroom building, erected in 19671968. Its style does not echo that of the older structures.



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
