Sandbag Tips

Properly placed sandbags can be an effective way to protect property during heavy rains by diverting water around low-lying structures.

Plan Ahead

We encourage residents to get an early supply of sandbags at local hardware, landscaping, or home improvement stores in advance of the rainy season and large storm events.

When heavy rains are forecast, Public Works can provide a limited number of emergency sandbags (up to 5 sandbags per property per year) while supplies last to help divert runoff away from buildings and to help prevent flooding and mudslides. Please bring your ID to prove residency.


How to Use Sandbags

- **DO** consider the terrain and vulnerable structures when laying out sandbags. Identify areas prone to flooding around your property, such as low windows or doors.
- **DO** use caution and safe lifting techniques when handling sandbags.
- **DO** create a channel for water to flow away from structures.
- **DO** use a solid plastic sheet or tarp in between the sandbags and the vulnerable area to prevent water seepage.
- **DO** push each sandbag into place.
- **DO** regularly check on the sandbag barrier to ensure it is intact and effective.

- **DO** stagger sandbags (like bricks in a wall) to create a stable structure when using multiple layers.
- **DO NOT** stack sandbags higher than three layers.
- **DO NOT** block drainage systems or natural flow paths as this can increase risk of flooding.
- **DO NOT** build a fortress around the perimeter of the property. This is typically unnecessary and doing so can actually trap rainwater between sandbag walls and structures, increasing the risk of property damage.

How To Store Sandbags

If you want to keep the clean sandbags for a potential future flooding event, make sure to store them in a dry place preferably indoors or undercover. A great tip is to get a garbage can with lid and keep the bags in there.



Burton Way Resurfacing Project

The Burton Way Resurfacing project will begin in March 2024 and construction will last approximately 6 to 8 months. The project will resurface the street pavement along Burton Way between Rexford Drive and the east City limits at Robertson Boulevard to rehabilitate pavement deterioration over time. Also, key improvements include upgrading curb ramps to meet accessibility requirements, installation of a concrete bus pad, and restriping travel lanes including buffers on the existing bicycle lanes. Typical work hours will be Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and the work hours may vary depending on the work activities and locations. Traffic lanes along Burton

Way may be reduced by one lane, with turn restrictions, but no lane closures are expected during peak traffic hours.

Active Adult Mobility Program

Expanding Transportation Options for Older Adults

In February, the Public Works Department launched the Active Adult Mobility Program. As part of this program, the City is studying ways to expand safe and reliable transportation options for active older adults who may begin to drive less frequently. This includes evaluating our existing mobility services for adults to determine if they meet the unique needs of our aging community members.

The program kicked off at the Annual Valentine's Day Dance, hosted by the Beverly Hills Active Adult Club and Police Officers Association. Staff hosted a booth to obtain feedback from seniors on their experiences traveling in Beverly Hills, which will help the City determine new transportation services or updates to existing mobility programs.

Over the coming months, the City will be attending additional meetings and events to ask our older adult community:

- How do you currently get around Beverly Hills?

- Are any travel modes challenging for you to use? If so, why?
- Which travel modes would you like to use more often?
- How can the City help make traveling easier or better for you?
