

BEVERLY HILLS POLICE DEPARTMENT EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

February 2023

Crime Summary

In February 2023, we saw a 13% decrease in offenses¹ compared to January 2023. Overall total offenses are up by **19**% year-to-date. We have had eighty-seven offenses committed thus far in 2023 compared to 2022. Our response time to emergency calls for service is 2.24 minutes, and we received 3,309 community-generated calls for service.

Community Engagement

- The Community Relations Unit (CRU) Conducted presentations led by Sergeant Newman, including Fentanyl Awareness for the City of Beverly Hills Recreation & Parks Commission and online Oral Interview Preparation Courses for police officer candidates.
- CRU School Resource Officers spearheaded events for the youth, including a station tour for Sacramento Police Department's Youth Group, a presentation with BHPD Support K-9 Nami at Hawthorne Elementary School, and assisted with 'Walk to School Wednesday.' They represented the Department at PTA events and Beverly Vista Middle School's Open House. On February 15th, the Unit celebrated our hardworking School Resource Officers on National School Resource Officer Day.
- Promoted the philosophy of Police and Community Together (PACT) with local businesses and discussed BHPD's efforts to promote safety and security at the Rodeo Drive Committee and the Beverly Hills Conference and Visitors Bureau.
- Participated in the Valentine's Day Dance at Roxbury Park, hosted by the Beverly Hills Active Adult Club and Beverly Hills Police Officers' Association, engaging with Beverly Hills' older adult population.
- CRU opened the application period for BHPD's Citizen Police Academy (CPA) and received numerous applications. The 8-week-long program offers City of Beverly Hills residents a behind-the-scenes experience and knowledge of police work that they may not have the chance to encounter. Selected residents will participate in scenarios, a ride-along with a police officer, and will spend a day at the Range, with presentations led by SWAT, Detectives, K-9 Unit, Crime Lab, and more. Class 6 begins on March 16. Residents interested in participating or learning about the program can visit https://beverlyhills.org/CPA. We will announce the opening of the next application period for Class 7 (Fall) on all social media.

Investigative Services Division

- In early February, detectives launched a grand theft investigation into a female suspect who entered various highend purse stores to commit theft. After reviewing city CCTV cameras and license plate readers, detectives located a suspect vehicle and were able to identify the suspect. Additional theft incidents were also discovered, and the suspect, along with a second female suspect, was identified. The use of video cameras and license plate readers was critical to this investigation. Detectives have requested a felony arrest warrant for both suspects.
- On February 7th, officers responded to a report of an aggravated assault that occurred in the business district. The initial investigation revealed that a male subject (possibly transient) battered an employee of a restaurant, causing serious bodily injury. Detectives were able to identify the suspect and filed a warrant of felony battery charges against him.

Traffic Division

-) In February 2023, the Traffic Bureau has continued to present to Council and the residents on the Parking Permit Program.
- Hosted eight (8) workshops, eight (8) 500 residential sign ups, and four (4) Farmers Market details to assist the public with the Parking Permit Program.
- Traffic Control Officers (TCOs) have issued 4,385 parking citations.
- Traffic Bureau taught a Standard Field Sobriety Test course at the department.
- TCOs continue to support the Metro projects on Wilshire Boulevard and increase its presence on Coldwater Canyon.







| Crime Category | Sub-Category | Description |
|----------------------------|--|--|
| ASSAULT | Assault – Aggravated | An assault with a weapon or with the intent to inflict severe or aggravated bodily injury. |
| | Assault – Simple | An assault with no intent and not resulting in severe or aggravated bodily injury. |
| | Assaults – Prior to Sept 2018 | All aggravated and simple assaults (previously combined). |
| BURGLARY | Burglary – Commercial Building | Entry into a commercial business after business hours with the intent to commit theft |
| | Burglary – Construction Site | Any entry onto a construction site with intent to commit theft. |
| | Burglary – Residential (Accessed Garage Only) | Entry <u>limited</u> to a garage (subterranean, attached to residence, detached from residence) with intent to commit theft. |
| | Burglary – Residential (Home Occupied) | Entry into a residence with the intent to commit a theft or any felony while the residence is occupied at the time of the crime. |
| | Burglary – Residential (Common Area) | Entry <u>limited</u> to a common mail area or laundry room of a multi-family residence with the intent to commit mail theft or coin theft. |
| | Burglary – Residential (No One Home) | Entry into a residence with the intent to commit a theft or any felony when no one is home at the time of the crime. |
| DUI ARREST | | The arrest of a person for driving while under the influence of any alcoholic beverage or drug. |
| HOMICIDE | | The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. |
| MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT | Motor Vehicle Theft | The theft of a motor vehicle. |
| ROBBERY | Shoplift Robbery | A shoplifter uses force against store security to retain property stolen from the location. |
| | Robbery | The taking of anything of value from a person by force or threat of force or violence. |
| SEX CRIMES | | Includes rape, sexual battery and sex registrant violations. |
| THEFT/LARCENY | Theft – Grand | Theft where the value of the property exceeds \$950, or is taken from a person, or a firearm of any value. |
| | Theft – Petty | Theft where the value of the property is less than \$950. |
| | Theft From Commercial Building | Theft (regardless of value) from a commercial business, building or office. |
| | Theft of Auto Parts | Theft, limited to auto parts, from the interior or exterior of a vehicle. |

| VEHICLE BREAK- IN/THEFT | Theft – Grand (From Vehicle) | Entry into a motor vehicle, without force, where the property stolen exceeds \$950. |

| | Burglary – From a Motor Vehicle | Forced entry into a locked motor vehicle with the intent to commit theft. |
