



City-School District Partnership Thrives

For 30 years, Beverly Hills residents have been the beneficiaries of a unique partnership between the City and the Beverly Hills Unified School District (BHUSD). The alliance speaks directly to the City's commitment of investing in the future of the community.

The longevity of its partnership with BHUSD is a source of pride for the City.

and recreational facilities – an agreement that gives the City a wider array of amenities that can be used to help fill the community's recreational needs.

In light of Beverly Hills' limited open space, this is an important contribution to the well-being of the community: the City depends on BHUSD facilities, buildings and athletic fields to further its mission



In an effort to develop and expand its technology infrastructure, the City will also provide the Municipal Access Network to all five school sites, along with Internet-based security cameras at key points around each campus. Both agencies are exploring a joint contractual arrangement to achieve economies of scale on common services, such as technology equipment and procurement.

This very close relationship between the City and District is fortified by a contractual document called a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) which spells out the relationship between the financial support provided by the City as it relates to the benefits received by the City and the community at-large. Over the term of the JPA, the City will annually provide in the range of \$10 million each year for the next four years with one-time funding of nearly \$3 million for capital projects and other services. The

In exchange for funding and services, BHUSD allows the City to use its educational

In addition, the District's computer labs, fitness rooms, and auditoriums along with school library facilities which supplement the City's library system, are an added benefit to the community. For its part, the City continues to provide funding to the District and in-kind services, such as school resource officers, traffic control officers, motorcycle officers and crossing guards.

New Buildings Go Green

With the recent adoption of a key initiative, the City is paving the way for Beverly Hills to become even greener. A new, landmark green building policy neatly dovetails into the City's desire to encourage community participation in protecting the environment for the future.

The policy is modeled after the U.S. Green Building Council's


takes green building a step farther by requiring energy-saving techniques that go beyond California state standards.

The City will require all new buildings to exceed the State's energy efficiency requirements by 15 percent and at least 2.5 percent of the building's energy demand must be met by solar power. The new program is expected to save, on average,

Employee Spotlight - Fire Captain Greg Barton

Behind the City's outstanding services stands a team of dedicated staff members. With an impressive Class 1 Fire Department rating (awarded to only 32 Fire Departments in the nation out of 37,000) by the Insurance Services Office – the highest level of fire protection given by the agency – the City of Beverly Hills' Fire Department is more than ready to serve.

The job:

Fire Captain for Engine Company 1, Greg works in concert with the community, leading some of the department's most successful training programs for residents and businesses.

Community impact:

The Fire Department has trained more than 85,000 residents in CPR, offered numerous classes in Disaster Assistance Response Training (DART) for school faculty, staff and students, and earned Beverly Hills the status of being one of only three cities in the state to be named a National Firewise Community.

Pipeline to the people:

He embodies the Fire Department's willingness to go the extra mile; fire-fighters regularly donate off-duty time to the community. They check in on elderly residents; serve as role models, as well as educators, for Beverly Hills children; and excel at protecting lives and property against fire and other disasters.



All in a day's work:

Along with promoting fire safety and emergency preparedness, the 91 members of the department, working in three fire stations, also provide fire prevention and suppression services, emergency medical and ambulance transportation services, and respond to hazardous materials incidents.

On a personal note:

Greg is a 13-year veteran of the Fire Department who last year received the prestigious National Firewise Leadership Award for his leadership and innovation in helping the community reduce the threat of wildfire.

Facelift for Arnaz Park

Just in time for summer, the newly renovated Arnaz Park now welcomes residents with several upgraded amenities – picnic tables, a water feature, a spiffy tot fire truck, and new landscaping. The improvements, which also include replacement of the park’s irrigation system, are part of an overall, mini-park renovation effort kicked off in 2000. Best of all, most of the funding for the park improvements came from state grants.

Think Outside the Sink

Following two consecutive years of below-average rainfall, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger has made it official: California is undergoing a statewide drought. The City of Beverly Hills has always recognized the importance of water conservation – and now, conservation is critical. Residents and businesses throughout the state are being called upon to safeguard our most precious natural resource.

With mandatory water rationing on the horizon, City officials urge the Beverly Hills community to do its part in water conservation efforts. Here are a few simple things you can do to save several gallons of water a day:



- ◆ Fix leaky faucets
- ◆ Water your yard before 8 a.m.
- ◆ Wash only full loads of laundry
- ◆ Install a “smart” sprinkler controller

As a city, Beverly Hills reduces water consumption by using “smart” irrigation controllers at parks, offers rebates on water-wise appliances and operates a water leak detection and repair program.
